Book club brings students together

Last school year, ER High School Principal Mr. Casey van Harssel conducted a survey with students and staff about school climate. One area that stood out in survey results related to the topic of race within the school. Rather than ignore this, Mr. van Harssel invited students to sit down with him to discuss racial awareness in East Rochester.

As a means for promoting more conversations between students and staff. Mr. van Harssel started a book club at the start of this school year. The volunteer group members read "The Hate U Give" by Angie Thomas. The contents of this story helped begin conversations about race and racial tensions. Students, faculty and staff met once a week to discuss topics that are a bit questionable like differences in people, how minorities are treated and if that tendency existed within East Rochester High School. After finishing the book, the club went on an educational field trip to see the movie version of "The Hate U Give."

The film was very direct about the subject of racism.

Mr. van Harssel then invited students to be on a panel to speak at a faculty meeting. Six members participated and took turns sharing their stories and perspectives about race within our school. Though the club itself will not meet as a book group, they are

IT Matters at ER

IT Matters was the name given to the East Rochester's instructional technology initiative. I had the opportunity to interview Director of Communications and Instructional Technology Mr. David Rovitelli. Next year, four of the IT Matters initiative, the instructional technology department will be replacing the first set of Chromebooks for the high school students with new ones. There will not be replacements for students in grades K-8. Currently, students in the grades K-2 use iPads in their classrooms and students in grades 3-5 keep their Chromebooks at the school. Students grades 6-12 are allowed to take their devices home. Students have been taking great care of devices.

Mr. Rovitelli indicated that, "The plan has been moving in the right direction. With the help of instructional technology coach Tadge O'Brien, the project is moving forward in a positive direction." Mr. Rovitelli also stated that the roll-out of devices has been very successful. He said, "the success has been that the devices and Google Classroom have been embraced immediately." He also said that the devices have "already made a difference with the way students do their work." One challenge has been that in the third year, there were more breakages and repairs than the previous two years. Mr. Rovitelli said this was not a surprise as the devices have been used everyday for three straight school years.

The Chromebook devices enable teachers to use tools to help students stay on track and get more immediate feedback. The goal is for technology to enhance education by providing a tool that the teachers and students can use to stay organized, get immediate feedback on assignments and make learning more engaging. Students and teachers are becoming more familiar with how to use technology to improve teaching and learning.

Mr. Rovitelli indicated that lots of healthy conversations are happening in order to adjust the district's technology plan as necessary. The plan is off to a great start, with only minor adjustments needed and we are where we need to be and the district knows what needs to come next.

Meet School Resource Officer, Andrew Hildreth

Officer Andrew Hildreth is the school resource officer at the East Rochester Union Free School District. His typical day starts at the police station checking for any problems that need to be addressed, helping direct traffic in the loop, and greeting students at the entrance to our school. After all that he checks the fire and exterior doors for safety, sometimes gets called in by administrators

or counselors, and then he gets to know all the kids by walking around the school and talking to them.

Officer Hildreth believes that our school needs a school resource officer (SRO) because having a police officer always in the school is important for protection against school shootings. He also believes that a school resource officer is important because it helps kids learn how to interact with police officers. Officer Hildreth believes that having a school resource officer around helps prevent kids from going down a bad path.

Officer Hildreth taught D.A.R.E for seven years and had to go to a two-week training program. Before he was a school resource officer, Officer Hildreth was a sheriff's deputy for four years and then a sheriff's deputy on road patrol for 20 years. After that he retired and was asked if he wanted to be the school resource officer. Officer Hildreth accepted his position as school resource officer because he loved working with kids when he was teaching the D.A.R.E program and he thought that he would fit in perfectly at the school.

In an emergency situation Officer Hildreth would use his training to react to the situation, then decide the next step that needs to be taken in order to ensure the safety of everyone in the school. In order to prevent any emergencies the school has many preventative measures in place like an advanced camera system that lets Officer Hildreth see any possible problems in the school. Our school also has several other plans in place to improve safety such as controlled access to the school, no open doors, and the fact that no one can enter the school unless an employee lets them in. Also Officer Hildreth says that because of the school's proximity to the police station that police could be at the school very quickly if a problem does occur.

Officer Hildreth wanted everyone to know that even with all this in place the school is still working on making us safer by improving the safety technology that we already had and adding some things that can't be discussed.

District Capital Project

As many of you probably already know, our district is planning a District Capital Project for our East Rochester Elementary and Junior/ Senior High School in the year of 2020. This project consists of remodeling and add-ons to our building like the new musical program addition from our old Technology room. I interviewed Mr. Dave Green, Assistant Superintendent for Finance and Operations and Mrs. Staci Sansoucie, District Treasurer/Assistant Business Administrator to ask them about the project.

Why did you decide on this project?

We have a guidance document called the Building Conditions Survey that contains details of all the systems and spaces within the entire building and surrounding school property. We go through the whole district building and facility and every space in the building gets prioritized for the future capital projects. We meet with facility members, boards and architects to determine what work needs to be done and what we can to improve the district, especially the music program. Since the music program is increasing, the space is being expanded and updated

What would you say to let the community know more about this project?

Historically, we have not needed to raise additional tax dollars for capital improvement projects. There is a portion of capital project costs that are not reimbursed to the school through state building aid. This portion has historically been covered by the funds in the district's capital reserve. We have been doing this to let them know what they are doing and what needs to be done.

What does this project mainly focus on?

The main focus on the project is the music department, the roof on the middle school area, the culinary arts program, a single point of entry to the Junior/Senior High School and a new maintenance barn.

How will this improvements affect the students and community members?

There will be minimal impact because we will try to do the project in the summer so it doesn't impact school, or the convenience of access. We will completely remodel and rebuild the front high school entrance, which will provide greater security, and some increased restriction. The front entrance expansion will offer students a better experience with the plays, musicals and band. The maintenance barn will be less noticeable and its functions will become invisible. The renovations will help maintain the campus to the next 50 years.

What is the total cost?

The total cost for the 2020 district project is \$9.6 million. Almost half is roof work on the oldest part of the school which will be a total of \$3.9 million; \$1.8 million will go to fixing the maintenance barn; the musical program will cost \$1.4 million, and the entry and safety security is going to be a total of \$2.5 million. How long will this project take?

It might take two summers, while school is running so we are not sure and we are going to try and be conscious and careful not to disturb the students throughout the school year. We meet with many construction workers and architects for this project weekly.

I hope this interview gave you more of an insight to how our school district will start looking and changing as this project takes place to make our school a safer and better place in 2020!



School budgets, explained

The school district budget is developed based on multiple factors. First, it is determined what programs will be offered or added for the following school year. This is done based on course selections and the history of student participation in different course offerings. If a high number of students sign up to take a particular course then it is likely that course will be offered. Second, it is determined how much money is needed to fulfill obligations based on employee contracts, utilities, and basic requirements to keep the school functioning. The amount of money needed for salaries and benefits for employees is known, but how much aid will be received from the New York state government is not usually determined until late in the budget process. Salaries and benefits and state aid are examples of expenditures and revenue. Another revenue source, local taxes, is determined by applying the New York State tax cap formula.

This calculation, which includes 11 components, is used to determine the maximum tax rate that can be assessed to East Rochester property owners. Finally, considerations for the future of our district are included, so a single year budget is prepared with a five-year plan in mind.

Creating the school district budget is a balancing act of offering quality programs and being aware of the financial impact the budget will have now and in the future.

East Rochester community members value and support the education of their children and they recognize the advantages of attending a school like East Rochester and the positive effect our school has within our community. The support of our community members, businesses, alumni, and local government are very much appreciated!

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
