East Rochester School Community,

Thank you all for a great start to the 2022-2023 school year! It is refreshing to have an academic focus, free of the overregulation we faced in our two most recent school years.

Our elementary students are benefiting from new readinginstructional strategies our teachers have acquired in recent professional development. Our secondary students have taken one more step toward adulthood as they enter the next grade and prepare ultimately for their senior year and what lies ahead for them after graduation. I am thrilled we have committed staff, students and families working toward a common goal of making sure our students have a clear path after graduation.

Our emergency response procedures are in effect, many times behind the scenes. Since the beginning of the school year our administrators, school resource officer and the East Rochester Police Department have investigated false reports, unfounded accusations and even monitored threats about a hoax played on school districts

in NYS which attempted to elicit full blown emergency responses to fake emergencies. This is in addition to an occasional student choosing to make inappropriate threatening statements to or about each other that cause us to respond much differently today than if the same comments were made when many of us parents were in school back in the day.

I ask our East Rochester families to ensure that our students are not engaging in risky communications with people they do not know on social media. We also realize that families can be a huge help and ally to schools as we try to eliminate social drama or the spreading of inaccurate information via social media. Thank you in advance for your assistance in avoiding significant interruptions to the educational process on our campus.

ER Elementary receives Primary Project National Certification



East Rochester Elementary School has been presented with a Primary Project National Certification from the Children's Institute. Primary Project is a national evidencebased program that helps children in Pre-K through third grade adjust to school, gain confidence, social skills and focus on learning. Primary Project addresses children's school adjustment difficulties and increases their chances for success by identifying young children who show emerging school adjustment difficulties and providing them with one-on-one time with a specially trained and supervised paraprofessional.

The program coordinator of the Primary Project in East Rochester is Elementary Principal Marisa Capuano. Program supervision during the start-up of the program was accomplished by Counselor Amanda Wigle and was taken over by Counselor La'Ron White for

the 2021-22 school year. ER retiree Sharon Smith was also integral to the program. Liz Pappas stepped into the role vacated by Mrs. Smith this fall.

To earn this certification, East Rochester Elementary School met the required number of critical and essential elements of the Primary Project rubric. Areas of strength in our Primary Project program are noted below.

- Services to children in pre-kindergarten, kindergarten and first grade.
- · A systematic screening and selection process.
- Services to children by a valued child associate.
- Consistent weekly supervision of the child associate by our certified mental health professional.
- · Quantitative program evaluation.
- Integration of Primary Project into a continuum of programs in the school.
- The Primary Project playroom is a well-lit, inviting space for students.

The certification is valid for three years through July 2025.

ER Schools remain busy during the Summer Break

The team at East Rochester Schools was busy over the summer, preparing for the new school year. Combining traditional summer programming with the numerous initiatives developed with the federal relief funds dedicated to learning loss transformed the traditional 10-month school calendar into a 12-month commitment to helping students develop to their full potential.

Seventy-three elementary students participated in our Summer Learning Academy, where they experienced unique learning opportunities. Henry Padron-Morales of Hipocampo Children's Books presented a series of interactive percussion sessions to familiarize students to the rhythms of Bomba and Plena. He used the traditional method of call and response to teach the rhythms and chants. Students also had the opportunity to hear former ER School Resource Officer Scotty Montecrieff play the bagpipes and discuss the culture behind bagpipes.

Seven students attended the special education summer program on campus and thirty-two students attended special education programs at BOCES or other out of district summer placements. summer that asked them to evaluate their organization, time management, study and test taking skills, decision making and problem solving— games like memory, Jenga and Battleship were used to help strengthen executive functioning for the transition to high school. Students also read articles focusing on the purpose of graphs, charts, maps and political cartoons which they will be exposed to during math, science and social studies classes. These articles ask students to analyze and reflect on the information, which is something they will be required to do in all of their classes at the high school. Though optional, ER Schools had a successful summer of High

Intensity Tutoring, with many students attending most days of the program. Students entering sixth grade in the fall were able to preview math concepts they'd be learning during the upcoming school year. Throughout the program, students gained confidence through "lightbulb" moments with concepts they had previously misunderstood.

In addition to the academic programs this summer, over 200 students received swim classes and open swim and sixty five students attended the inaugural ER Jazz enrichment camp in August.

During the Reorganizational Meeting on Tuesday, July 12, 2022, the East Rochester Board of Education elected a new president for the 2022-23 school year.


Board member Patrick Flanagan was elected by the board to serve as president this year. He replaces former president Jennifer Majewski Lesinski.

Thank you to the ERPTO for welcoming back our teachers for the 2022-23 school year with a special gift. It's going to be a great year!




ERPTO depends on you!

Mark McDermott receives Distinguished Alumni Award

Since 2009, fifteen people have received the East Rochester Alumni Foundation Distinguished Alumni Award. The award serves to "recognize former East Rochester graduates for noteworthy lifetime accomplishments and contributions. Additionally, the award offers a powerful opportunity to underscore the potential which exists for kids who are lucky enough to grow up and be educated in East Rochester."



For many years the award was presented at our Sam Urzetta Alumni Classic Golf Tournament. These past two years the presentation has taken place at a dinner at the Quinzi Lodge in Eyer Park.

This year's recipient is Mark McDermott. A 1974 ER graduate, Mark received degrees from Community College of the Finger Lakes and Nazareth College, majoring in environmental science and fine arts. As a sculptor, his works can be seen throughout the Rochester area, and his work on our village Parks Committee has shown his care for our community. The words on the plaque he received state:

Founder of his Archigraphia design firm and a leader in the East Rochester Parks Committee and Housing Authority. An accomplished artist, sculptor, and environmentalist whose works are unique and provocative. Whether creating memorials for events or people of the past, or supervising the planting of trees and gardens for the present, Mark is helping to ensure our future. ER Schools enhance security protocols

As we work to continually improve school safety and provide a secure and safe learning environment for our students, we've enhanced our safety and security protocols in a number of ways over the summer months.

- One enhancement is a new electronic access control system. This new system
 includes an updated and improved management system to monitor access to
 our building, as well as strategic additions such as door lock scheduling at key
 entryways and magnetic-hold open device scheduling to further control traffic
 throughout our facility.
- We are also in the process of rekeying all exterior doors to the main building to only allow access through our updated electronic card access system for the majority of our staff and building users.
- Aside from physical facility upgrades, we've increased our contracted security services to provide additional coverage in the evening hours and extended monitoring of our single point of entry for a majority of after-school events.
- Lastly, we have reviewed our emergency response plans with all staff during our opening day faculty meetings, to ensure preparedness for a variety of potential emergencies we may encounter.
